Important issues addressed at the AGM

Twenty six residents attended the Annual General Meeting on 5th June.

A busy year!

The Year in Retrospect

Lucy Gildersleeves presented her Chair's report and referred to essential time-consuming infrastructure activities which had made it a busy year:

- policy statements updated to meet legal and insurance requirements;
- improvements carried out to the hall and playing field;
- additional information now available on the Village website;
- dialogue with the Parish Council on respective responsibilities relating to the playing field, the woodland area and the bridleway.

She thanked the Trustees (paying tribute to the work undertaken by Peter Busby during his year as Secretary) and all the volunteers who help CHAFT to run the hall and the field for the community at large.

Challenging Times Ahead?

David Sibbert (Vice Chair) referred to a recent emergency meeting called following the

- Secretary's decision to stand down as Secretary and Trustee
- Chair questioning whether she should stand down
- Three trustees indicating this might be their last year.

He explained that the Chair had now agreed to carry on for one more year but CHAFT was without a Secretary.

The meeting agreed urgently to address three outstanding initiatives which would help the organisation to 'GET ON TO THE FRONT FOOT':

- commitment to address succession planning;
- commitment to review CHAFT's outdated governing document;
- commitment to change how the management committee undertakes its business to reduce the workload of the Secretary.

The need for secretarial support was seen as the most urgent issue.

Secretarial support needed urgently

Finance

Christine Trotman (Treasurer) reported on the accounts:

- income was down on the previous year mainly due to the cancellation of the patchwork & quilting classes:
- the annual Fete organised with St Peter's Church had brought in just under £1000;
- expenditure had increased due to £802 being spent on remedial electrical work in the hall;
- looking ahead a contribution of £2,500 would be made to the Parish Council towards the cost of removing the Aspen trees on the field.

Village Table Tennis Group Goes Modern



A table tennis table has been available in the Village Hall for many years. It was regularly used by the Youth Club until it closed in 1995

It came back into regular use in 2005 when a group of villagers began to play on an occasional basis. This was the forerunner to the formation of the current Charney Table Tennis Group who purchased a second-hand table when the Hall was modernised in 2010.

Last month saw the arrival of a brand new table which is safer and easier to move, erect and store. It has been funded by the Group and helped by a grant of £100 from the Charney & Lyford Educational Trust.

The Club meets twice a month and caters for all ages.

Libellula depressa (Broad-Bodied Chaser) photographed in Charney June 2019

This dragonfly is usually found at ponds and may be the first to colonise new ponds. It regularly returns to the same low perch after swift flights along the pond margins. Widespread and common throughout southern England and Wales, its broad appearance separates it from the other Chaser and Skimmer dragonflies. The male is powder blue, female yellow-brown



Councils are asking drivers to 'Turn it off' if they are stopped for a minute or more



Just one minute of sitting with your car engine running and the vehicle not moving produces the equivalent of 150 balloons of harmful pollutants into the air.

This is why South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse district councils have launched a joint campaign to help improve air quality across southern Oxfordshire.

The campaign called 'Turn it Off' has been endorsed by Public Health England and is aimed at drivers who leave their engine running even when the vehicle is not moving. This often happens when a vehicle is parked but the driver is still inside, waiting for someone outside a school or a shop.
