## WE'RE A QUALITY COUNCIL!

A Government Rural White Paper published in 2000 confirmed the Government's support for parish and town councils and underlined their important role as the first tier of government closest to local people. Consequently the Quality Parish and Town Council Scheme was launched in 2003 with the aim of defining a minimum standard for councils across the country.

A Quality parish council is expected to be representative of and actively involve all parts of their community; to be effectively and properly managed with members upholding a high standard of conduct; to express the communities needs through effective communications and to work in partnership with other local authorities to deliver local services.

So far, out of the 10,000 plus town and parish councils in England just over 500 have achieved Quality status. While the benefits of the Scheme are not immediately obvious in the short term, Quality councils will

have more clout in dealing with District and County councils.

In 2007, your council opted to go for Quality status and The Clerk assembled a portfolio to show that the council met the 50+ criteria. The Oxfordshire County Accreditation Panel met early in 2008 to consider the portfolio and agreed to grant



Quality status to Charney Bassett Parish Council. We are the smallest parish council in England to achieve this accolade. There are only four other Quality councils in Oxfordshire, three of them Town Councils (Didcot, Carterton and Bicester) and one other parish council - The Bartons, Banbury.

With its track record of improvements to village amenities and the various ways it communicates with villagers, councillors felt they were performing as a quality council and it is pleased to have this confirmed by this achievement. The council will not rest on its laurels and will continue to strive to do its best for the community.

## CHARNEY FIELD

On 14th February, when most men in the village were getting their Valentines breakfast in bed (!), The Charney Army mustered and prepared the Field for tree planting by digging lots of holes and hammering in lots of stakes. The tree-planting morning on 16th was a great success (even if cold!), with a variety of specimen trees and shrub stands with a total value approaching £1,000 now in place. This is a real achievement on everybody's part, with special thanks to Geoff and Julie Rumble and the Charney Army. CHAFT would also particularly like to thank the many residents who sponsored the purchase of the trees and shrubs - and you can still do this if you missed out on the first round

The trees have been laid out with a path meandering through them leading to a picnic area. Their progress will be watched carefully and contingency plans are in place to water them if global warming gives us a long hot summer!

The bird and bat boxes have been installed, again thanks to The Charney Army and the locations are indicated with tree markers to identify the "owners" of the boxes. Evidence of pecking suggests that birds are already investigating the boxes, so we cross our fingers and look forward to updates from Derek McClintock to whom thanks are due for project managing this enterprise.

## COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

There are three major issues facing the Council at the moment. The first is that it needs to comply with European Directives to stop waste going to landfill to avoid the heavy fines for non-compliance that will be imposed (upwards of £3m). An invitation to tender for methods of waste disposal other than landfill resulted in all tenders proposing an incinerator (otherwise known as Energy from Waste)

A lot of people are upset about this proposal and the Council Chamber visitor's gallery was full of people wanting to protest. The Cabinet will now look at the proposals and narrow them down to a preferred bidder. I expect an incinerator to be built in Oxfordshire during the next few years.

The second issue is the provision of a safe lorry park in Oxfordshire for HGV drivers who travel long distances with precious cargo. At the moment there isn't one in the county. OCC officers are now investigating sites for such a park.

The third issue is the budget which, after going through all the Scrutiny Committees each of which made recommendations to the Cabinet, has resulted in a Council Tax increase of 4%. The pressures are around Adult Social Care, Waste and Road maintenance.

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## NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION GROUP

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Hi there. I am PC Paul Rowland; I am a member of the Neighbourhood team based at Faringdon. The team consists of Sergeant Elaine Tearney, myself, PC Phil Redmond and PC Simon Jenkin. We are supported by four Police Community support officers (PCSO's). Dave Clarke, Serena Stockwell, Maralyn Pack & Myra Stokes. As well as Faringdon town we cover villages East & West including Charney Bassett. This area is known as Neighbourhood Action Group 2 (NAG 2). Phil Redmond has a geographical responsibility for the East and is supported by PCSO's Clarke & Stokes.

Should you have any information about local matters or wish to make contact with the neighbourhood team\* we can be contacted on

08458 505 505. This is the non-urgent number and if we are on duty you will be put through, or be able to leave a voice mail message if we are off duty. There is 24hr cover by response officers when we are on and off duty. For emergencies use 999 or 112.

Currently the top priority as identified by public consultation on NAG 2 is speeding. A speed indicator device (SID) is at our disposal and has been used at identified locations. This is due to be deployed again soon so make sure at all times you watch your speed. **And don't get caught!**

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## OCK BRIDGE

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You may have seen (and heard!) publicity in the media about a serious crack in the bridge over the River Ock. This is now being repaired by OCC Highways but the Parish Council is still pursuing a weight restriction through the village to prevent a recurrence. First response from OCC is "No" and maybe Plan B - an "Unsuitable for HGVs" sign will

have to be adopted. Meanwhile, if you see an HGV struggling through the village, make a note of the name on it and, ideally, a telephone number as well and tell the Council. We have found some damage to Ock Green caused by an HGV and we need evidence to press our case. A knowledge of where these vehicles have come from and are going to will help.

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## FROM YOUR MP - ED VAIZEY

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Many congratulations to the parish council for being earmarked as excellent, a real feather in your cap.

February was the month when Councils - county, district and parish - set their bills for the coming year. I was contacted by one lady pensioner after my last column asking why I had not highlighted the difficulties many pensioners face with their Bills. I am duly admonished and would go further and say that council tax is a real burden not just for pensioners but for many families. After our mortgage and food, it is probably the main item of our monthly household budget. This column is not meant to be political. However, it is worth pointing out that the County Council's grant from Government has increased by two per cent next year, and by just 1.75% and 1.5% for the subsequent years - all below the level of inflation. Nevertheless, the County has succeeded in limiting any increase to below 4%, and has found £10 million in efficiency savings.

Council tax is too high - but I still think it is the best system in principle for local taxation, mainly because it is easy to collect. I think we need to look at how we help pensioners, and also how we reduce the burdens on local

government set by central government, in order to bring costs down.

On another constituency matter, I am delighted that, after a long campaign, we have succeeded in introducing post-16 special needs education in schools across the county. This was a campaign led by parents, and supported by all local MPs, and it is very gratifying to see a good result.

Finally, the employment arrangements of MPs came under scrutiny in February. I do not employ any family members. My wife Alex is a successful lawyer so wouldn't work for me anyway. My son Joseph, while obviously a genius, is only sixteen months old. By the time you read this, we will with luck have been joined by a fourth member of our family (due on February 29th). As I will be taking paternity leave, you should see fewer pictures of my ugly mug in the local paper. But there will be no diminution of other services as I will continue dealing with post and e-mails.
