ROAD SAFETY UPDATE: LATEST NEWS

On the 16th June representatives from the Parish Council undertook a tour of the village with a Senior Officer from OCC and had wide ranging discussions on the results of the previously undertaken traffic volume and speed survey and the outcomes of the public consultation exercise held in April 2018.

At the meeting the County Council representative made a number of key points relating to:

- Traffic volumes and speed
- Chicanes and Speed humps
- New Road Southern Junction
- New Road one-way designation
- New Road - 'Access only' designation
- New Road North Junction
- Buckland Road hedge/new footway
- Longworth Road footways.
- '20 is Plenty' Campaign
- 'Please Drive Safely' signs
- Warning sign 'Pedestrians in Road'
- Road surfaces
- Village Entrances and White gates
- Moving 30mph zones further out
- 'Count down signs' to 30mph zones.
- Vehicle Activated Signage
- Vegetation overhang
- A420 diversion routes
- Buckland Rd./ Longworth Rd. footpaths

THE PARISH COUNCIL VIEW

The Parish Council at its July meeting noted that the County Council has offered to pursue a number of measures to address hedge overhang, potholes, lack of footpaths and safer white lining but is now aware that expenditure on any of the major proposals put forward by the Road Safety Group would need to be borne by the Parish Council.

After detailed consideration the Parish Council resolved

1. That a sum of £3,500 be 'ring-fenced' for spending on road safety;
2. That the Road Safety Group be advised that the Parish Council's view was that priority be given to providing a Vehicle Activated Sign;
3. That the Road Safety Group be asked to continue its work and report further on suggested actions in the light of the feedback received from OCC and available finance;
4. That the Clerk should notify the Highways Department that the various actions it had offered, including 'pedestrian in the carriageway' warning signs, are supported and should be taken up.

Lead Thefts in Oxfordshire

Lead thefts are on the rise again in Oxfordshire. Thieves often remove a small amount of metal at a time, making repeat visits to clear the site. Alerting police may help them identify and catch such criminals.

Therefore, if you see any suspicious behaviour or unfamiliar vehicles, it is best to note the vehicle registration numbers and a description of the suspicious individuals and alert the police.

Calling 999 on such occasions is best.

A Community or Neighbourhood Action Group is a group of people with a real interest in helping to improve their local area. They get together to discuss local concerns and how they can all work together to tackle them by proactive problem solving.

Who can join the Group?

Members should consist of local people who have a real interest in shaping the policing in their area. Partner agencies, Police and key stakeholders also attend meetings but it is chaired independently.

What is the Police's involvement?

The neighbourhood policing team will be in attendance but not chair the meeting. They will be there to help make decisions and commit to realistic and achievable actions.

Residents in South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse areas are being strongly reminded not to put medical waste in their recycling bins.


CHARNEY FETE

The Benefice Blanket Trees are coming back!



Will you help us make a difference to women and children in need by knitting or crocheting 8" (20cm) blanket squares this summer? The squares will go to make blankets for women's refuges, women in prison and for AIDS orphans.

We will be collecting the squares on our blanket trees in the churches in Charney Bassett, Littleworth and Longworth during Advent and Christmas, and sending off the squares in January.

A simple knitting pattern for making your blanket squares

To knit a square, please use double-knit / chunky knit / Aran / worsted wool. (not single-knit / fine weight wool, please)

Cast on a single stitch and then increase by one stitch at the start of each row until your square's sides have reached 8" (20cm). (Your knitting row is the diagonal of the square)

Then decrease by one stitch at the start of each row until you are back down to the single stitch and cast off.

Please leave a tail of wool 20" (50cm) long. This is important as it will be used when the squares are sewn up into blankets.

If you don't knit or crochet yourself, could you give wool to someone else who would enjoy making up squares?

HISTORY SITE NEWS

READ THESE FASCINATING EXTRACTS ABOUT LIFE IN CHARNEY BASSETT IN THE 19TH CENTURY. (TAKEN FROM THE [FAMILY TREE OF THE BEESLEY FAMILY.](#))

Charles Painter, of Charney, servant in husbandry to Mr. Charles Beesley, of the same place, farmer, was brought up on a warrant, on the information of his master, for leaving his service without his consent. Defendant denied that any document was made, but the Bench ordered him to return to his service, and to have 14s deducted from his wages for costs.

William Woodbridge, of Charney, labourer, was charged with stealing a quantity of wood, the property of Mr. Charles Beesley, of the same place, farmer, and was committed to Reading Gaol for six weeks.

VISITORS TO THE FETE HUNT FOR THE MONKS OF THE MANOR

25 families, adults and children, took part in the Monks in the Manor walking around quiz at the Fete. Information from the history website was spread around the Manor, allowing the question sheet to be completed, and prizes won. Comments from those who took part referred to the need for a longer and slightly more involved game. Others had found the quiz interesting and made discoveries about the history of the village
