Face Masks

For those not already aware, Julie Ingram-Johnson has been busy using her sewing talents to produce face masks. They have been made available for local residents to peruse and select, with a donation to the children's hospice Julie has supported for many years. Already £288 has been made thanks to your kind donations.

The masks are available to view on a table in the carport of Gunton Barn (last house on the right at the top of Charney Green, opposite the pub). New designs, including fabrics depicting various sports, are being put on the table daily.

All Face Masks have been made with washed, new fabrics. There are three layers - fabric designed outer layer, flannel middle layer and a close weave reverse layer - new, thin elastic loops to hold masks behind the ears or pulled to the back of the head and clipped (the latter may be more comfortable for people with glasses or hearing aids).

The masks will fit adults but Julie will make children's masks if asked.

Summary of Charney Bassett Parish Council meeting of 13th May

On 13th May, the Parish Council successfully held its Annual Meeting by Skype, also attended by 4 intrepid residents. This meeting format looks likely to continue for a while.

Chairman David Roberts was re-elected for a further year, with David Nellist as Vice-Chair. In his-annual report, the Chair thanked many local residents for their voluntary work throughout the year, with a particular mention to Councillor Mary Castle who stepped forward to coordinate the Village response to the Covid-19 crisis.

Many matters were discussed, including:

- Approval of an updated **Emergency Plan**;
- End of year finances and balance (just over £7,300);
- Increasing lorry movements from NAP Grabhire premises (Fyfield Wick);
- McBains Yard and the Old Schoolhouse, New Road (site not to be put forward);
- Purchase of a police-approved speed gun for exclusive use by the Village Speedwatch Team:
- Improvements to the Village website to give improved accessibility, including for the disabled:
- Whether to increase speed awareness signage through the Village;
- Postponement of replacement public seating due to Covid-19 restrictions;
- Future Parish Council involvement in the management of Charney Field.

Do you know who your children are speaking to online?

During lockdown, many of us are turning online to stay in touch and this goes for children as well as adults. Sadly, some criminals are using these extraordinary circumstances as a way to exploit and target young people when they are online.

Thames Valley Police have seen an increase in reports of online sexual abuse involving children since movement restrictions were introduced and are urging parents to take this opportunity to have honest conversations about online safety with their children and to review privacy settings on the apps and social networks that they are using.

In order to support parents during COVID-19, the National Crime Agency's Child Exploitation and Online Protection division are producing fortnightly activity packs to help discuss staying safe online with your children.
