0800 555 111 - A Number to remember

Thames Valley Police have frequently repeated that their success in fighting crime is very dependent on the efficient gathering of relevant information – 'criminal intelligence' – from the public. So, everyone has a personal stake in helping this process.

The Neighbourhood Watch national website - <u>ourwatch.org.uk</u> – offers ideas of what to look out for under various crime headings. Even those living in peaceful, low-crime areas may occasionally overhear or see something that is suspicious or 'doesn't look right.' Putting together criminal intelligence has been described as a bit like a jigsaw, and even little bits of information can help – by confirming other pieces perhaps. So, it is important that everyone report things that they feel could help the police.

Immediately call 999 if you see a crime being committed or in an emergency. Call 101 to report anything else to the police – or go online to do so. This requires you to provide your own contact details, and even though these will be treated in complete confidence by the police, sometimes this can cause reluctance to 'get involved', which is understandable. However, the police do not want your 'piece of the jigsaw' to be missed. It could be vital!

So, the police are partnering with <u>CrimeStoppers</u> to remind everyone of The 3rd Number – 0800 555 111 that enables you to report your information totally anonymously if you prefer. Please <u>view</u> this <u>link</u>, and consider adding the number to your mobile phone speed-dial list so it is easily available when needed.

While contacting the police directly – especially if you could be an important witness – is what we hope most people will do most of the time. Having the CrimeStoppers anonymous alternative plays a vital part in helping the police to complete the criminal-intelligence 'jigsaw'.

Whichever way you do it - please report it!

Bill Clarke, B.E.M. 1920-2021





Bill was born at the beginning of September 1920 and came to Charney at the age of six weeks, to be fostered by Mr and Mrs Brant at 25 New Road.

He attended Charney School. Known as Billy Brant, when the teacher called the register and read out the name Ernest Clarke, everyone looked round curiously, including Bill.

Bill joined the RAF in June 1940. He married Mary in September 1941 at Lyford church. They later had two girls Sheila and Maureen. In 1942, when a British bomber crashed and caught fire, Bill was one of the first on the scene, helping to drag out members of the crew. He received the B.E.M. from King George VI.

My first memory of Bill was of him delivering logs to 25 New Road on a Saturday morning. Like Bill, I lived there and even had the same back bedroom which he had occupied, though 40 years earlier.

Bill's first love was cricket and he helped to form the Denchworth and Charney Cricket Club back in the 1950s. He also loved his holidays. I travelled with him and Mary to Canada and later with Bill to Australia. Bill and I also flew together on Concorde and enjoyed a trip on the Orient Express. I was unable to travel with Bill to China but on that holiday he met June, who he later married in December 2001. I was now redundant as Bill's travelling companion. After over eighty years in Charney, Bill moved to Thame with June.

During his many years in Charney, Bill served the village well, on the Parish Council and on the Village Hall committee for over 40 years. He helped with the Feast on the Green, and was a member of the Charney Amateur Dramatic Society (CADS).

Bill was the first to have a television in the village, and was one of the first to drive the Stanford in the Vale community bus. He was a member of the RAF Association and the British Legion, doing the rounds in Charney for the annual poppy collection. On Remembrance Sunday, he would read out the names of the Charney and Lyford fallen in the Church and on the Green.

It has been my honour to say a few words about Bill, a great friend and great man.

Remember, to be valid an objection must address one or more of the <u>licensing objectives</u> (prevention of crime and disorder; prevention of public nuisance; protection of children; public safety).

Charney History - What's new since November's Charney Chatter?

We have had two **descendants of Charney** folk contact us via the website:

- One from America who traced her ancestry as a <u>direct descendant of John Atta Yate</u> of Charney, c1330.
 Her branch of the family left England in the 1600s when George Yates came to America and settled in Maryland.
- One of Charles Beesley a <u>miller</u> at Charney Mill 1845 to 1850 and his son, Charles Jones Beesley was christened there on 6th September 1846.

Both were delighted to find the wealth of relevant information on our website and to make contact with the village; the American Yates are hoping to visit us next summer.

Calling all **House Detectives**: Was your house built before 1950? Do you know or would you like to know who lived in it between c1900 and c1940? Robin Border, on behalf of the history group, has been building up a database of residents from various sources including the censuses and incorporating information from Maud Ody's book extracted by Ian Graham. The 1921 Census is due out in early Jan 2022 and this will be incorporated. When complete we will add this house occupancy information to the website early in the new year but, need to think how best to present this material. Meanwhile if you have information on this period to share then please do so via charney.history@btinternet.com.
