At the Annual Parish Council Meeting on 10th May, Alex Pyle from the Vale of White Horse District Council Waste Team gave an informative presentation explaining about what happens to our waste and how to optimize our recycling.



A few recycling tips:

- Try to clean all items before placing in the green bin, e.g. no dirty tin foil please or greasy pizza box cardboard;
- No film plastic, only tubs, trays, cartons, tetra packs;
- No hard plastic like plant pots
- No mixed items, e.g. waxed paper, Pringle tubes, laminated wrapping paper and cards;
- Metal means tin cans, aluminium cans and clean foil, not old pans and random metal items;
- Glass means jars and bottles only, not mirrors or glass panes.

Garden waste (the brown bin if you have one) is purely for that: grass clippings, twigs and trimmings etc, not rubble or similar, nor is it for food or vegetable peelings, which should go in your weekly green caddy collection. The food collection will also take up to one litre of spent cooking oil if placed in a plastic bottle next to your green caddy. For more comprehensive information, see the <u>VWHDC web site</u>.

With a little thought, we can all help reduce waste, recycle better and support the environment.

Increase in Dog Fouling

This subject raises its ugly head once more. Whilst it should be acknowledged that most owners do pick up after their dogs, the Parish Council have received complaints that dog fouling is becoming an increasing problem again, particularly along Buckland Road and The Green (and there have been recent complaints on Charney's Facebook page about fouling at the corner of Orchard Close as well). Here are the main reasons why picking up after your pooch is important:

- Harmful to public health dog poo carries bacteria and parasites that can be harmful to other pets and humans, such as Toxocariasis.
- Harmful to the environment dog poo is not fertilizer and is generally toxic to the environment. Unlike cow or horse manure, which is basically composted grass, dog poo is more acidic. Therefore, it is more likely to destroy grass or other plants that it is left on/near rather than nourish them. Further, it can take up to a whole year to bio-degrade and during this time, any bacteria/parasites in it are likely to be spread by rainwater into drains or water courses.
- The law under the Dog Fouling of Land Act 1996 allowing your dog to foul public land without cleaning up after it is a criminal offence which can land you with a Fixed Penalty Notice. Any fouling in a public space should be removed using a suitable plastic bag and placed in an appropriate bin, such as the dog waste bin near the junction of New Road/Buckland Road, or the one where Main Street meets Buckland Road. There is also another bin available by the bus shelter on Main Street. Alternatively, you could always deposit it in your own general waste wheelie bin at home.

So, this is a plea to those who avoid picking up... try to make sure you always have dog waste bags with you when you are walking your dog so that you can take responsibility for their mess. Do not leave it to pollute the environment, or for someone else to step in.
